Most government employees can accumulate a maximum of 30 days annual leave to carry into the following year. Overseas employees have a 45-day ceiling. SES employees have a 90-day ceiling. One day is equal to eight work hours. The Leave Year ends at the start of the first complete pay period of the new calendar year. The 2011 Leave Year ends Dec. 31, 2011, for most employees, and the 2012 Leave Year ends Jan. 12, 2013. Most federal employees with fewer than three years service earn 13 days annual leave every year (four hours biweekly). Those with between three and 15 years service earn 20 days (6 hours biweekly), and those with 15 or more years, as well as all SES and SL/ST employees and equivalents, earn 26 days (8 hours biweekly). Some employees may receive credit for years of work experience outside the federal civil service.
